RAIDER REPORT

As I come to the end of my 8th month as Trinity High School's latest athletic director, I have much good news to report. In the spring semester last year, our wrestlers made it to state, and Blaise Morris and Briar Roberts won Trinity's first-ever state matches. Around the same time, our boys basketball team won the Aleris Christmas Tournament and took the runner up trophy at the All A tournament; our girls basketball team made it to the regional tournament with only seven full-time players. In March, Trinity archer Blake McBrayer qualified for the national championships in indoor archery. Our Lady Raiders softball team came in 2nd in the All-A tournament and won the 12th district tournament, which I think was our first championship since moving into that district. In June, our outdoor archery team stepped "right out of the woods" to snatch a S3DA state title and a runner up spot in the national tournament. Along the way, our student athletes broke school records, signed to colleges, and managed to put our tiny school on the competitive maps.

Since the current school year began, we have completed a growing year in golf. New coach Isaac Rhodes is excited about where his team is going, and he looks forward to working with the golfers in the coming years. Our cross country team is growing and improving. Just this past weekend (October 26), Gavin Howard and Jacob Howard both qualified for the state meet, and our team, as a whole, came in 7th at the regional meet. Tonight (October 28), our Lady Raider volleyball team, which came in second at the district tournament, will play in the regional match

against Breckinridge County. Our basketball and wrestling coaches are gearing up for their upcoming seasons, and I look forward to more victories and broken records from our student athletes.

I think it's often easy to take our successes for granted, but I have learned, in the past 8 months, how much work really goes into these victories: from the athletes, their coaches, and their families. Students practice almost daily to improve their skills, pushing themselves outside of their comfort zones to be better than they were the day before. The coaches, most of whom have families and full-time jobs outside of athletics, have to plan practices and schedule games, and before they can do that, they have to fill out more paperwork and complete more classes than I had to complete before buying my first house. The family members are there, too: parents, grandparents, and siblings. They transfer the athletes to practices, work where needed at the games, and cheer on the teams until they can hardly speak.

I shouldn't be surprised, though. Though athletics is a completely new world for me, my experiences with this community have always been with people who give everything their all. People who work to be better, and people who are supportive of one another. People who sometimes don't reach the goals they set for themselves, but who never let a defeat keep them down.

I am thankful to have been a part of this community for so many years, and I look forward to what the rest of the year holds for Trinity athletics. I appreciate the support I have received from



everyone, and I am especially thankful to the coaches who give so much of their time and talent to support the kids I love so much and to make sure they are competitive in athletics. The skills you are teaching them – grit, sportsmanship, etc. – will benefit them throughout their lives, and the examples you set – selflessness and supportive natures – will help our young people become the wonderful men and women God intends for them to be.

Traveling Classroom

Members of Trinity High School's Traveling Classroom recently returned from a Pilgrimage to Spain and Portugal where they visited many elaborate churches and monasteries, including the Sanctuary of Our Lady of Fatima. Since its inception on 2010, inspired by Father Richard Powers and established by Joe Bland and Christina Rhodes, members of the class have traveled to Europe 5 times and taken 86 students and 7 adults to cities in Italy, England, France, Ireland, Wales, Scotland, Spain, and Portugal.

This is the first year the students traveled to the Iberian Peninsula. The students marveled at the elaborately adorned cathedrals and universities. At the site of the Miracle of the Sun, they prayed at the gravesides of Saints Jacinta and Francisco and also the gravesite of Lucia (who has not yet been declared a saint). DeeAnna Wathen, current trip organizer for the Traveling Classroom, described the Fatima experience as a truly peaceful one.

Student travelers have been learning about Spain and Portugal since August and will wrap up the second semester with reflections on the trip. The culminating project is a sponsor dinner during which they will feed those who helped make the trip a reality for them, and they will share videos, photos, and speeches in which they tell about their experiences.

The plan for the class has always been to introduce our students to the world and to allow them to "walk in the footsteps of the saints," according to Joe Bland's original pitch for the class. In 2017, adult chaperone Brian Payne, though, pointed out how exciting it was to let the rest of the world get a taste of what Trinity is all about by introducing the world to our students.
