CHARITABLE DONATION INFORMATION

The Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act (CARES Act) was enacted on March 27, 2020. In order to encourage charitable contributions in 2020 (for any charitable purpose, not just contributions to charities related to the COVID-19 crisis) the CARES Act increases the maximum 60% of AGI charitable contribution limit to 100% of AGI limit for 2020. This means that you can get a charitable contribution deduction for the full amount of your Adjusted Gross Income. Charitable contributions in excess of this amount can be carried forward for five years subject to the 60% of AGI limit in those years. The higher 100% of AGI limit applies to cash contributions made directly to charitable organizations, not to contributions to donor advised funds, supporting organizations or private foundations, if you itemize your contributions. Individuals will be able to claim a \$300 above-the-line deduction for cash contributions made, generally, to public charities in 2020. This rule effectively allows a limited charitable deduction to taxpayers claiming the standard deduction.

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RAIDER REPORT

While sports are certainly not what they used to be, I am happy our THS and SMWS athletes competed in fall sports, and I am hopeful the winter season will begin soon, even if later than we'd hoped.

From March through July, athletic directors and coaches read through much research-based information about how to bring sports back to our communities. We have moved forward with socially distancing players and fans, staggering ingress and egress times for practices and games, sanitizing equipment and hands, and wearing masks when not actively playing a sport.

Though the fall season started a little late (for every team except golf), after months at home, with little exercise or sports-related camaraderie, seeing our students on the practice floor and playing games was a great reward, even if things looked a lot different.

Last week, we were prepared to start our winter season, but we learned in a November 18 KHSAA meeting that basketball games and wrestling meets would be on hold until at least January 4. We hope to hit the ground running that week with the first round of the All A Tournament. One of the most heart-breaking restrictions in sports this year has been the limitation of fans at our games, both at home and away, and that practice will really hit home for our Raider Faithful when basketball season starts. Depending on the state of the county (i.e. red zone status) and the number of teams playing on a given night (boys team, girls team, or both, with or without cheerleaders), the number of fans will be limited to a certain number for each family with a player or cheerleader on a team. The basketball games, like the volleyball games, will not be open to the public.

We have had to cancel Blue/White Night, and I don't know yet what homecoming will look like, but I know it will look different. We have been working on getting games posted online for the fans, but that process has been slow and not always effective. Thanks for your patience as we figure this out.



I appreciate your support and understanding as we continue with the season. I know we all have a lot to gripe and complain about as we move through a COVID-19 world, but please join me in being thankful our athletes are playing, even if we can't all be there in person to watch. This year, more than ever, will be about letting the kids play, with or without us. And let's pray this trouble passes us soon.
