FROM OUR PRINCIPAL

What can we take away from the last 16 months living through the first pandemic in our lifetime? There was much loss! I believe that many of us can say we missed something important in our lives. It may have been Easter or Christmas dinner with our family, a planned vacation, a graduation, a delayed wedding, or simply sitting with mom, dad, or grandparents. I think it is safe to say that we all missed something important to us.

Last school year, the staff at Trinity High School worked hard to keep our positive school culture. We did daily announcements on social media to stay connected. We made signs for the seniors in the Class of 2020 and put them in their yards. In fact, the school year truly did not end until baccalaureate and graduation—in late July! What a year!

We opened the 2020-2021 school year on August 26, 2021, which was both an exciting and scary time! The administration worked through so many regulations that changed weekly (if not daily), and our teachers were trained to use Google Classroom, so they could be prepared to teach students in person and from home due to quarantine. While we were not able to have an overnight retreat, we did use

our two 14-passenger buses to transport our nine seniors to St.



Joseph in Fordsville to have a three-day, off-campus retreat. It was a success! The administrative team could not figure out how to safely meet the guidelines for dances, so Trinity High School did not host any dances this year. Prom, sadly, was a loss at school this year. Nevertheless, I do know that some of our parents worked hard to host an off-campus event, which our students gratefully enjoyed. Once May rolled around, things began to get close to normal. Baccalaureate and graduation for the Class of 2021 were wonderful, beautiful events.

By the time this is printed, I will no longer be the athletic director for Trinity High and St. Mary of the Woods Schools. When Mrs. Hernandez and Mr. Morris first discussed my finishing out the 2018-19 school year, I wasn't exactly sure of what to expect, but as a former colleague of Larry Farmer's, I knew there'd be a lot. Of course, no one could have anticipated a world-wide pandemic and its impact on athletics.

As I make the final arrangements for handing over the reins to Mr. Josh Bowlds, I reflect on lessons I have learned over the past two and a half years.

First, we have amazing coaches, at every level. People are always surprised to learn that over the course of any given year, the athletic director works with more than 55 coaches at the schools. At the high school and middle school level, the classes and certifications required from each coach are many, but that's nothing compared to the time and commitment to our students, which are required of coaches at all levels. Most of these coaches have their own families and their own jobs that they have learned to balance with their coaching responsibilities, and I marvel at how they do it all. They're not in it for the money or the fame; they love their sports, and they love our kids. Please be kind to your coaches and to their families.

Next, we have great student-athletes. Even when I wasn't involved in athletics. I knew that we had wonderful students. Now, though, I am a little more aware of how much time they put in at practices and at games. They often leave for away games at 4 or 4.30 (sometimes after brief mini-practices), not returning to school until 9.30 or later, and then they still have to finish their homework. To top that off, they often participate in camps and clinics to improve their skills. And guess what? Most of our top academic students are also involved in athletics to some extent or another. I have known this since I worked with the girls basketball team back in the mid-90's, and the fact has

always impressed me.

Also, we have the best parents and grandparents around. Trinity's athletic program could not exist without the support we have from our parents and grandparents who work (or arrange workers) for every single game, especially at gate and in the concession stands. Our parents and grandparents also tirelessly drive the kids to and from practices and are our biggest supporters at ball games. During this past year, when schedules kept getting messed up thanks to COVID cancellations and restrictions, every time I reached out to parents, I had a great response from some who would offer whatever help I needed. I am so thankful for the many times they put my mind at ease.

Finally, I cannot say enough thank yous to our supportive administrators, especially Emily Hernandez. She knows how important our athletic department is, and she wants to strengthen it, for the sake of our students and our schools. She is constantly making sure we keep up with regulations, and she is always supportive of our current, former, and future athletes. She knows that despite our small size, we are and should be competitive. She wants the best for our schools, in all areas. She answered every question I had about sports (and there were many), and I can't

thank her enough for the support she has shown me. She is a true

leader for our schools.



In my 28 years at THS (and SMWS), I've seen a lot of ups and downs. As far as athletics, I've seen years when we were at the top of our game and years in which we have struggled; I've seen one sport do well in a year when another sport can't seem to get a foothold. This is common, I think, and we must always know we can be successful in any given year. What is not common is the incredible combination of coaches, kids and supporters that make Trinity and St. Mary the best places to be. Endowment Fund History

In 1988, the Trinity High School Board recognized the importance of the long term financial security of the school. It laid the groundwork for the fund. Since then, the fund has grown to over \$845,000! In the last 20 years, the fund has contributed over \$300,000 toward THS operating costs, including \$25,000 in 2021 alone!

How is my donation invested?

All assets donated to the Endowment Fund are positioned by the committee into various equities and fixed income investments as determined by the current financial climate. The fund targets a balanced investment portfolio of 50% stocks and 50% bonds or other fixed interest investments, such as CD's.
